

2018 Olympic Games - Ice Hockey - By The Numbers

PYEONGCHANG - By the numbers for ice hockey which begins on Saturday 10 February at the Kwandong Hockey Centre with the women's match Japan against Sweden.

1920 - Ice hockey and figure skating are the only two sports that have been contested at both the Summer Games and Winter Games. Ice hockey was first on the Olympic curriculum at the Antwerp 1920 Olympic Games.

43 - Four years ago at the Sochi 2014 Olympic Winter Games, Teemu SELANNE (FIN) became the oldest player in Olympic ice hockey history to win a medal. He claimed a bronze medal as part of Finland's men's team.

33 - Most goals scored by one team in an Olympic ice hockey match, by Canada facing Switzerland in a 33-0 victory at the Chamonix 1924 Olympic Winter Games.

22 - The United States is the NOC with most appearances at the Olympic Games in which ice hockey medals were contested. Team USA will contend for the 23rd time in PyeongChang.

20 - Canada's women's team has won each of its last 20 matches at the Olympic Winter Games.

15 - In Sochi in 2014, Alina MUELLER (SUI) became the youngest athlete to claim an Olympic medal in ice hockey. At age 15, she collected a bronze medal as part of Switzerland's women's team.

9 - Canada's men's team has won a record nine Olympic gold medals.

6 - SELANNE and Raimo HELMINEN (FIN) have made a record six appearances at the Olympic Winter Games in ice hockey.

5 - Two athletes have won a record five Olympic medals in ice hockey, Hayley WICKENHEISER (CAN) and Jayna HEFFORD (CAN).

4 - Canada's women's team won the gold medal at each of the previous four Winter Games.

3 - Finland is the only men's team that won a medal in ice hockey at each of the previous three Olympic Winter Games.

2 - The United States has won its only two Olympic gold medals in men's ice hockey on home ice.
